I write in connection with your request for information received by Suffolk Constabulary on the 4TH April 2018 in which you sought access to the following information:

1. *“How many children did you identify as victims of CSE in 2013-14, 2014-15, 2015-16, 2016-17 and 2017-18?”*
2. *How many children did you identify as at risk of CSE in 2013-14, 2014-15, 2015-16, 2016-17 and 2017-18?*
3. *How many CSE crimes did you investigate in 2013-14, 2014-15, 2015-16, 2016-17 and 2017-18?*
4. *How many CSE crimes are you currently investigating? Please provide the approximate date of the oldest crime (month and year).*
5. *How many CSE victims on record since 2013-14 were female?*
6. *How many CSE victims on record since 2013-14 were male?*
7. *How many CSE offenders on record since 2013-14 were female?*
8. *How many CSE offenders on record since 2013-14 were male?*
9. *Please provide the number and % breakdown of ethnicity of all CSE victims on record since 2013-14, specifically White, Black, Asian, other, unknown/not recorded*
10. *Please provide the number and % breakdown of ethnicity of all CSE offenders on record since 2013-14, specifically White, Black, Asian, other, unknown/not recorded”*

Response to your Request

The response provided below is correct as of 4 April 2018.

Suffolk Constabulary has considered your request for information and the response is below.

In relation to your request for information and in accordance with Section 17 of the Freedom of Information Act 2000 (FOIA), this response serves as a formal notification of refusal for your request. Suffolk Constabulary does not hold, for the purposes of FOIA, the information you require in a retrievable format.



It is estimated that to attempt to retrieve all of the information you require would take a considerable amount of retrieval time, which would exceed 18 hours. This would exceed the appropriate limit for dealing with Freedom of Information requests, in terms of costs and therefore Section 12(1) of the Freedom of Information Act 2000 applies.

Suffolk Constabulary obtained our new crime management system Athena in October 2015, prior to this date the constabulary systems did not allow for the recording of Child Sexual Exploitation crimes in their own right. Whilst a flag was introduced in 2014, this was not consistently used by Officers and therefore to retrieve cases where children were identified at risk of CSE would require a manual search through the free text of all relevant offences between 2013 and October 2015.

Considering there are many hundreds of offences recorded by the Constabulary in any one day, the retrieval of this information would take in excess of 18 hours work.

Section 12(1) of the Freedom of Information Act 2000 states that a Public Authority is not obliged to: "...comply with a request for information if the authority estimates that the cost of complying with the request would exceed the appropriate limit." The Freedom of Information (Appropriate Limit and Fees) Regulations, defines the 'appropriate limit' for the Suffolk Constabulary as £450 and specifies that this sum equates to 18 hours work at a standard rate of £25 per hour.

In accordance with Section 17(5) of the Freedom of Information Act 2000, this letter serves as a refusal notice for this part of your request.

By requesting all information your request is too broad to be complied with within the £450 limit imposed on Freedom of Information requests.

Should you wish Suffolk Constabulary to conduct a more limited search for the above information, please specifically describe the information you would like us to search for.

If you are dissatisfied with the decision made by Suffolk Constabulary under the Freedom of Information Act (2000), regarding access to information, you must notify Suffolk Constabulary that you are requesting a review within 20 days of the date of its response to your Freedom of Information request.
