I write in connection with your request for information received by Suffolk Constabulary on the 24 April 2019 in which you sought access to the following information:

“For the period 1st January 2019 to 31st March 2019 can you please tell me how many drone/UAV related calls have been received by Suffolk Constabulary, with a breakdown of the nature of the call, any action taken, and the month the call was received.”

Response to your Request

The response provided below is correct as of 9 May 2019

Suffolk Constabulary has considered your request for information and the response is below.

A search has been completed of the Constabulary’s call data for all incidents recorded that contain the term ‘Drone’ or ‘UAV’ for the time frame specified. Each call has then been manually reviewed to remove irrelevant calls and those that relate to emergency service use of drones.

The table provided below confirms the total number of incidents recorded during January – March 2019.

Freedom of Information Act (2000).

If you are unhappy with how your request has been handled, or if you think the decision is incorrect, you have the right to ask Suffolk Constabulary to review their decision.

Ask Suffolk Constabulary to look at the decision again.

If you are dissatisfied with the decision made by Suffolk Constabulary under the Freedom of Information Act (2000), regarding access to information, you must notify Suffolk Constabulary that you are requesting a review within 40 working days of the date of its response to your Freedom of Information request.
