Freedom of Information Request Reference N^o: FOI 001786/19

I write in connection with your request for information received by the Norfolk and Suffolk Constabularies on the 13th May 2019 in which you sought access to the following information:

Please can you supply the following information:

Vehicle registration number

Vehicle Make

Vehicle Model

Of all vehicles owned currently and previously by you (on a lease or rental agreement no need for short term hire vehicles) over the last 12 months Feb 2018 to Feb 2019 & Feb 2015 to Jan 2018

If it is easier to reply by giving more vehicle information then fine. Replies preferable in an excel format.

My request is for vehicles owned by Norfolk Constabulary, purchased outright, rented (HP agreement) or any type of lease.

Response to your Request

The response provided below is correct as of 7th June 2019.

Norfolk and Suffolk Constabularies have located the attached information as relevant to your request.

We have not provided the details of any vehicles which will be used in a covert capacity due to exemptions within the Act. Additionally, with regard to unmarked vehicles, the full registration numbers have not been provided.

Section 17 of the Freedom of Information Act 2000 requires that Norfolk and Suffolk Constabulary, when refusing to provide such information (because the information is exempt) are to provide you the applicant with a notice ban which:

- (a) States that fact
- (b) Specifies the exemption(s) in question and
- (c) States (if that would not otherwise be apparent) why the exemption(s) applies.

The information is exempt from disclosure by virtue of the following exemption(s);

- **Section 31(1)(a)(b) – Law Enforcement**

Section 31 is a qualified and prejudice based exemption and I am therefore obliged to articulate the harm in this information being disclosed and assess the public interest in disclosure.

Harm for section 31

Disclosures under the Freedom of Information Act are published and are therefore accessible to anyone who has internet access. For this reason, it is essential that careful consideration is given prior to any disclosure.

Norfolk and Suffolk Constabularies will use unmarked and covert police vehicles for anonymity, where there is an operational requirement to do so. There will be occasions when officers or staff will need to use unmarked vehicles in order to undertake enquiries, for example in relation to domestic or sexual offences. It is therefore essential that, in order to safeguard victims and witnesses, vehicles are not identified as belonging to the Police. Providing details of Constabulary vehicles purchased for this purpose would therefore increase the likelihood of identification.

Additionally, unmarked vehicles will be used in a covert capacity, therefore releasing the details would undermine the law enforcement capabilities of the Constabularies and therefore Section 31 is engaged.

Section 31- factors favouring disclosure

Vehicles are purchased using public funds therefore providing the information would indicate the spend on vehicles. Openness and transparency are fundamental principles of the Freedom of Information Act. Knowledge of the Constabularies capability will ensure transparency is maintained and the public can identify whether funds are being appropriately managed.

Section 31 - factors favouring non-disclosure

Disclosure of information that can affect the current and future law enforcement capabilities of the Constabularies will always favour non-disclosure. Vehicles will be purchased for a specific purpose and if unmarked/covert vehicles are identified by a disclosure under the FOIA, this would be a waste of public funds as replacements would need to be purchased.

Where such vehicles have been identified, this could place members of the public, including victims and witnesses and members of the Constabulary at risk.

The identification of covert vehicles would jeopardise any ongoing and future investigations and operations.

Balancing test

Providing details of covert and unmarked vehicles increases the likelihood of individuals identifying vehicles which may be used to undertake operations and investigations.

The Constabularies recognise that there is a public interest in the way in which public funds are being spent and the types of vehicles being purchased. However, we would not disclose information which would assist those involved in criminal activity to have prior knowledge of covert Police operational capabilities, thereby compromising the prevention and detection of crime.

The Police Service has a duty to ensure public safety is never compromised and disclosures under FOI should always ensure this is maintained.

The Constabularies consider that the provision of the details with regard to overt fleet purchases will satisfy the public interest.

It is the Constabularies decision that the balance lies in non-disclosure and the application of the exemption is maintained.

If you are dissatisfied with the decision made by Norfolk and Suffolk Constabularies under the Freedom of Information Act (2000), regarding access to information, you must notify the Norfolk and Suffolk Constabulary that you are requesting a review within 40 days of the date of its response to your Freedom of Information request.
