Freedom of Information Request Reference N^o: FOI 002232/19

I write in connection with your request for information received by the Norfolk and Suffolk Constabularies on the 14th June 2019 in which you sought access to the following information:

Data of all offences investigated by Norfolk /Suffolk police where an offence was committed against the following acts (between 1st April 2018 and 1st April 2019):

- Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981 (as amended)
- The Protection of Badgers act 1992 (as amended)
- The Deer Act 1991 (as amended)
- The Conservation of Habitats and Species Regulations 2017

Can the data please contain the following information:

- Targeted Species
- Date the incident occurred
- Details of method e.g. Trap/baiting/poisoning
- Area e.g Norwich, Kings Lynn

Please can I have the information in the form an excel spreadsheet or similar

Response to your Request

When responding to a request for information under the terms of the Freedom of Information Act, a public authority is not obliged to provide information if the authority estimates that the cost of the retrieval of the information requested would be in excess of £450 (equivalent to 18 hours work).

The costs criteria relates to a request in its entirety, which means that if we cannot retrieve all of the information requested within the costs limit, we are not obliged to retrieve *any* of the information requested.

The Norfolk and Suffolk Constabularies estimates that to retrieve all the information you have requested for both forces would exceed cost in excess of £450 (per force).

Research has been undertaken regarding offences that would fall under the acts referred to above. Many of these are non-notifiable offences and will not be recorded on the Constabularies crime system.

Therefore in order to identify relevant information, a review of incident reports has been carried out using the words, Deer, Badger and Habitats. For Norfolk, this has returned 1,028 reports and for Suffolk, 829. Wildlife and Countryside have not been researched as these would return significantly more reports.

It would be necessary to read through each of the incident reports to see if any hold information relevant to your request. This would take a minimum of 3 minutes each therefore this would exceed 51 hours for Norfolk information and 41 hours for Suffolk.

This would exceed the appropriate limit for dealing with a Freedom of Information request, in terms of costs, and therefore Section 12(1) of the Freedom of Information Act applies.

Section 12(1) of the Freedom of Information Act states that a public authority is not obliged to:

“...comply with a request for information if the authority estimates that the cost of complying with the request would exceed the appropriate limit”.

The Freedom of Information (Appropriate Limit and Fees) Regulations 2004, defines the ‘appropriate limit’ for the Norfolk and Suffolk Constabularies as £450 for each Constabulary, and specifies that this sum equates to 18 hours work at a standard rate of £25 per hour.

In accordance with Section 17 of the Freedom of Information Act (2000), this serves as a Refusal Notice for your request.

Advice & Assistance

Although excess cost removes the Constabularies obligations under the Freedom of Information Act, as a gesture of goodwill, we have supplied information, relative to your request, which was retrieved or available before it was realised that the fees limit would be exceeded. I trust this is helpful but it does not affect our legal right to rely on the fees regulations for the remainder of your request.

Ask Norfolk and Suffolk Constabularies to look at the decision again.

If you are dissatisfied with the decision made by Norfolk and Suffolk Constabularies under the Freedom of Information Act (2000), regarding access to information, you must notify the Norfolk and Suffolk Constabulary that you are requesting a review within 40 days of the date of its response to your Freedom of Information request.
