Welcome to the June 2016 Lowestoft SNT Newsletter.

In previous newsletters we have looked at the new SNT Pcs0 roles and which officers are assigned to them. This month we will have a quick look at some of the things the Pcs0's have been up to...

PCSO 3190 Paul Dennington who is the Vulnerable Community PCSO. Just some examples of the work he has recently done are linking in with different groups in Lowestoft such as the Befriending Scheme doing activities with persons with learning needs. He is also doing some work with a local factory and the college linking in with migrant communities. Paul has also been working with various supported living locations doing follow up work with vulnerable adults.

PCSO 3079 Sarah George is the PCSO for the Chronically excluded; Sarah has been linking in with partner organisations from supported living and support groups and has been engaging with the identified vulnerable service users.

PCSO 3087 Steve Wicks has been concentrating on the ASB reports such as nuisance in parks or neighbours in conflict. There has been a number of successes with mediation and neighbours now getting on better.

PCSO 3129 Pete Lamin will be taking up the mantle in relation to crime reduction and looking to support the various watch schemes. Pete will also be a point of contact for any regular communications with the Parish Councils.

PCSO 3296 Adam Chapman has been working with our Health partners in order to provide support and help to those who are in need within the community. He has done some good work with building relations with some high demand individuals suffering with mental health issues. He is working to try help integrate the multi-agency approach to dealing with persons who come into contact with both police and health services.

PCSO 3233 Lloyd Sandeno has been working on licenced premises conducting spot checks on premises to ensure licence conditions are being adhered to. He has been identifying premises that have regular problems and creating a demand on the policing services or have a negative impact on the community. Lloyd has also been looking to provide greater support to retail premises.

PCSO 3079 Sarah George, PCSO 3135 Justin Winn and PCSO 3022 Norman Drew have been working together with young persons and have been building relationships with children homes and schools. A number of educational inputs have been given regarding E-Safety, Personal safety and plans are made for further inputs. Norman who is the Schools Officer has had some success with missing children being promptly returned, dealt with cases of sexting and incidents of bullying.

PCSO 3135 Justin Winn has been dealing with domestic abuse working with the Maple team and IDVA who offer ongoing support to domestic abuse victims. He has been conducting reassurance patrols around the most vulnerable victims and assisting with visits to those difficult to engage with.

PCSO 3181 Michael Soanes is working in the Lowestoft Business Improvement District and has a good success rate in detecting shop lifting offenders in the town. Continued enforcement of the DPPPO which prevents persons who are acting antisocially having an open can of alcohol in the street has led to numerous cans of alcohol being poured away and some work has been done to put in place Community Protection Notices against those persistently begging.

Unfortunately, Suffolk Constabulary have not been in a position to publish any crime and event data for April, May or June. The reasons for this revolve around some issues we are currently managing with our ICT system. We know this is frustrating for our communities and apologise for the current situation. Our ICT team are working very hard to rectify this, sorting this out is a priority for us. When it is rectified we will be able to publish both current and historic data as required.

Here are some of the things you have fed-back to us

Burglary - The police have given me confidence in them and the service was great.

Vehicle crime - I feel they couldn't have done any more.

Burglary - The police were understanding and they were not grumpy when we reported the incident incorrectly. My wife is deaf and the police were very accommodating and understanding.

Burglary - The police was reassuring and gave me support and looked after me after the incident as well.

Vehicle crime- There can only do so much with their resources.

Vehicle crime - They did all they could and we knew that we wouldn't get our diesel back.

Burglary - The police did all they could do.

In Kessingland there has been some incidents of stone throwing at cars and houses. If you have any information about this then please get in touch with us.

There has been some complaints regarding cyclists recently.

Cyclists have been traveling along the lower esplanade of Lowestoft beach rather than using the upper esplanade where there is a cycle track. Please cycle considerably, it is an offence to cycle on a footpath.

Local officers continue to conduct patrols at Nicholas Everitt Park due to youths causing damage.

There have also been reports of youths starting fires in Bonds Meadow. If you have any information regarding this then please get in touch with Lowestoft SNT.

We want boat owners to be able to enjoy the delights of the Norfolk and Suffolk waterways without being victims of crime.
