You said...

Anti-social behaviour and intimidating behaviour caused by some young persons outside a secondary Academy was causing parents, pupils and teachers distress.

We did...

Worked with partner agencies, the school, parents and those concerned to understand why the behaviour continued to take place, and then using diversion tactics as well as enforcement to prevent further issues from taking place.

Responding to issues in your community

We have investigated drug related activity amongst some young people locally that gave us cause to believe that there were females under the age of 16 at risk of exploitation. We have built intelligence around all parties involved, consulted with social services and the local Council, resulting in a Child Abduction Warning Notice being served on one male. No evidence existed to show that any female had come to harm, but this very powerful tactic has ensured we have provided the females and their families an additional layer of safeguarding.

Making the community safer

'We have spoken to you a lot about the changing demands we are facing in policing our communities and keeping you safe. In order to keep you updated and to help you understand the demands that we are dealing with on a regular basis, we have developed a focused section as part of this newsletter highlighting the demands at both your SNT and force level across a typical week. Preventing, reducing and solving crime and ASB

The Constabulary recently circulated information via the press and social media about a scam where the elderly and the vulnerable have been duped into purchasing large quantities of iTunes or similar vouchers. We continue to ask the community to spread the message to those they feel may be targeted. PCSO Perry who is our Retail and Licensing point of contact, has been visiting various retail outlets highlighting this scam and issuing informative letters produced by our Crime Reduction team.

On the lead up to Halloween we visited all local shops and reminded them of the importance of not selling eggs and flour to young people, as historically we know this is a common way causing anti-social behaviour by mixing or throwing the two items together at vehicles and premises. Reports to Police suggest that we experienced a quieter period locally than in previous years, so some of this work has paid off.

A reminder to be extra vigilant and ensure your properties are secure with appropriate lighting and if possible alarms and/or CCTV fitted following a spate of house burglaries particularly in the rural villages - CID officers are currently investigating.

By the time this Newsletter goes out Firework night has long passed us, however, some individuals still decide to carry letting off fireworks, sometimes not in the true spirit of a display. If we receive complaints of anti-social behaviour concerning fireworks we will take action where possible.


